## CAYMAN ISLANDS

In the 1960s the tourist industry grew at a fast rate, and there was a resulting land sales boom. High value revenue stamps were introduced to cover a $7 \%$ tax on land sales, $1 \%$ duty on mortgages and $\$ 40$ settlement duty on deeds and land sales documents controlled by the Land \& Survey Dept. Also the tourism boom produced a greater need for tax stamps for passport duty and airport departure tax.

Earliereditions of thissectioninour"British Commonwealth Revenues" were based on the 1990 study by Giraldi \& McCannin The Revenue Journal Vol 1 no 3. That pioneer work listed some items which have not been seen since. The QEII section of our catalogue has now been radically rewritten for the next edition, based on Andrew McClellan's empirical listing of issued material at www.revrevd.com . Dates are mainly based on recorded cancellations; if readers find earlier dates, please tell us. Relative scarcity is not known for every stamp listed; if readers have access to good stocks and can comment on desirable price changes, please inform us. The issues of c1974 and c1977 list only some values of thefourpossiblefacevalues andfivepossible colours, as only those listed have been seen so far. If readers find furtherunlisted values, we will be happy to add these to the listing.
